Mitchell Fair General Rules and Regulations

Please read the rules carefully here and with each class throughout this book.

- a) All exhibitors must obtain an exhibitor number from the secretary and complete an entry form to receive a payout.
- b) Entry Fees for Adult Classes are \$5. Junior Classes are Free (check age restrictions). Horse Classes are 15% of prize money.
- c) Entry tags, forms and books can be picked up at Mitchell Office Pro. Tags are also available the week before the fair in the office at the Crystal Palace. Books and forms also available on the website, mitchellfair.com.
- d) Online registration begins August 1st. Visit our website for more information. Entry tags are still required.
- e) Prize money can be picked up during the fair. Please allow half an hour after judging has been completed. We request all cheques be cashed within 30 days.
- f) Farm and garden produce must be from the exhibitor's farm or garden.
- g) Manufactured articles must be produced in the year by the exhibitor in which they are exhibited.
- h) Exhibitors shall, if required by the Directors, make a statutory declaration that the articles exhibited by them are exhibited in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Society.
- i) Our Directors will take every precaution to secure the safety of articles sent to our fair. However, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting. Should any article or animal be accidentally damaged, lost or stolen, the Directors will assist in recovery, but not make any payment for the value thereof.
- j) The Society is not responsible for any accidents that occur on the grounds during the fair.
- k) The Directors reserve the right to change any classes at any time during the fair.
- l) The Directors shall have the power to withhold a prize if the judge reports an animal or article unworthy of a prize, and there is no compensation.
- m) Protests must be delivered in writing to the Secretary, within 24 hours after the judges have made their decision. A sum of \$10 shall be deposited with each protest and shall be forfeited if the protest is not allowed.
- n) Any person guilty of creating a disturbance, or openly criticizing a judge, another person or using obscene language, shall forfeit the right to any prize money and may be asked to leave the fair and be suspended from exhibiting by the Society.
- o) Any person violating the Rules and Bylaws of the Society shall forfeit his premium or be liable to a fine or expulsion from the Society at the discretion of the Directors.
- p) Only one entry per person per section of a class will be allowed. This rule shall not apply to animals.
- q) In case of bad or unfavourable weather or other reasons causing the receipts to fall short of paying expenses and all prizes in full, a proportionate amount, exclusive of membership, will be deducted from prizes to enable the Directors to balance the accounts without a loss to the society.
- r) The Mitchell & District Agricultural Society will not hold itself responsible for any print errors in this prize list.

- a) Mitchell Fair General Rules & Regulations apply.
- b) Contestants must reside in the Municipality of West Perth.
- c) The contestant must be at least 17 years old before August 1, this year.
- d) Community organizations are invited to sponsor one contestant-male or female.
- e) The sponsor is to provide the contestant with a corsage/boutonniere and a sash/collarete, with the name of the sponsor.
- f) The sponsoring organization is asked to introduce and tell something about their contestant.
- g) Contestants must attend the Fair Opening Ceremony. Details at the beginning of this book.
- h) Each contestant will be interviewed and expected to deliver a prepared speech, 2-3 minutes in length on one of the following topics:

- Agriculture
- Agricultural Societies
- Some aspect of the Mitchell Fair

- i) Following the speeches, each contestant will be asked to speak for 1 to 2 minutes on an impromptu topic or subject.

What is expected from our Fair Ambassador

- Participate in the Mitchell Fair and our Fair Parade.
- Represent our Fair at other local Fairs and Events.
- Attend the District 8 Annual meeting in October.
- Attend the Annual Convention in Toronto in February.
- Participate in the District 8 Ambassador workshop in March and the competition in April or May.
- Promote the Mitchell Fair and the Ambassador program.
- Represent the Fair at annual meetings when possible.
- Compete at the C.N.E. next year for a chance to represent Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies.

- The contestant must be 7-12 by the time of the competition
- All contestants must participate in some aspect of the youth or adult division portion of the fair, see classes within the fair book.

Expectations of the Little Heron

- Your child must arrive around 3pm, unless otherwise specified.
- Each child will participate in cake decorating prior to competing during the stage portion, be a part of dinner with all the contestants and compete on stage.
- Each child is expected to bring an item from home that they will be able to talk about on stage or answer any guided questions about their item.
- The cakes that are decorated earlier in the day will be auctioned off while the judges deliberate to raise funds towards the next years of the Little Heron program.
- The panel of judges (who will be from surrounding agricultural societies or our community) will use a points system awarding for clarity, presentation, fair entries and stage presence.

- Please wear the sash when attending the fair.
- Participate in the Santa Claus parade in December.
- Participate in the church service Sunday morning; help with taking up the offering.
- Participate in the Pet Show on Sunday

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL CATTLE

- Tuberculosis and Brucellosis: Tests and Health of Animal Certificate are not required to cover cattle originating from Herds in Accredited T.B. or Brucellosis free regions, of which Ontario is one.
- Other diseases: Animals showing evidence of Active Ring worm, Mange or Pinkeye are not eligible for exhibition and will be refused entry to the fairgrounds.
- All Cattle exhibitors must fill out and submit a "Livestock Traceability Form" with their entry form to the the Fair Office.

Cattle Rules and Regulations

- Mitchell Fair General Rules & Regulations apply.
- All Exhibitors must obtain a \$5 exhibitor number, complete an entry form and submit it before the competition to the secretary in the Crystal Palace.
